


250 YEARS

The celebration of the beginning of the modern circus occurred in London, England on April 2, 2018, with Zippo's Circus performers and their horses recognizing 250 years in the making.

The first American Circus occurred in Philadelphia on April 3, 1793.

The well known Lion and Gladiator Bandwagon is now at the Feld Entertainment Main Offices in Ellenton, Florida.



2018 CHS CONVENTION

Are you going to the Circus Historical Society Convention in Baraboo July 18-21st?

The abundant circus history, heritage and legacy present in Baraboo will be celebrated over a span of four days. The heart of the assembly will be four sessions of presentations on Thursday and Friday July 19 and 20. One will focus on local and Wisconsin circus history. Another will be on women of the circus, with a largely female slate of presenters. Two panel discussions are currently being planned, one whereby managers of the largest publicly-accessible collections will make attendees aware of the latest developments and acquisitions.

Local flavor features include a special tour of the recently restored and truly resplendent Al. Ringling Theatre, America's oldest and among the most elegant of motion picture palaces. A tour of multiple circus proprietor homes, several never before available to public access, is being arranged. Registrants can also take part in a tour of the local cemetery, using a recently produced guidebook.



CORRECTION:

Our dear friend and fellow historian, Richard J. Reynolds III, contacted me to tell me we made one mistake in the article in our February issue about the crates on the Ringling Flatcars.



We wrote "What is loaded on the transports (and flat car) are crates containing three rhinos that Frank Buck had purchased from the show and were being shipped to Buck's exhibit at the World's Fair."

Richard wrote: "They held hippos, not rhinos. For the seasons 1936 though 1944 RBBB did not have a rhino, the longest such stretch in its field show history. However they did have a surplus of hippos in the spring of 1939 - -5 to be exact. They commissioned Frank Buck to try and sell 3 of them (He had been the big cheese on the '38 show). So the hips went into the crates and rode the canvas section to Long Island City for the first under canvas date. The crates were unloaded from the flats and sent to Frank Buck's animal compound near Amityville, Long Island."

The International Circus Hall of Fame in Peru, Indiana is located in the original remaining barns of the American Circus Corporation. Each spring they have a work week where volunteers (local residents, circus fans, model builders etc.) are offered the opportunity to come help improve the place. This year, they will be there from May 14th to the 20th. There's always something to be worked on whether you can help for a couple hours, a day or the entire week.

HAGENBECK-WALLACE / TROOP TRAIN WRECK

This May 17th, the Greater Showman's Assoc. of Chicago will be holding a commemoration service of the 100th Anniversary of the horrific train wreck involving the stopped Hagenbeck-Wallace Circus train and an empty troop train in Hammond, Indiana.



The Circus Hall of Fame will have the Sig Sautelle Band Chariot there. Crafted by Sullivan and Eagle in Peru, they made wagons for the Hagenbeck-Wallace Circus also. This event will be celebrated on Thursday May 17, 2018 at Woodlawn Cemetery; 760 Cermack Road; Forest Park; Cook County, IL.

The formal program at 1:00pm will feature several well-known speakers whose expertise is circus and carnival history. The 3:00pm to 4:00pm informal gathering might prove to be the most interesting as we would like the attendees to relate their personal experiences with Showmen's Rest and those who are interred here.
